



Currently, approximately 73% of those children attending the breakfast club and the after school learning centre are those in receipt of pupil premium funding. In these cases teachers report that children are better prepared for the school day and are completing their homework on a regular basis which is leading to accelerated progress.



77% of the children that have received counselling are children in receipt of pupil premium funding and class teachers report that these children are better able to access their learning and as a result make better progress.




#### The Impact


The progress of the pupils in receipt of the pupil premium grant is closely monitored by the Literacy and Numeracy subject leaders and by the Senior Leadership Team on a termly basis and reported to school Governors. Interventions are put into place to accelerate the progress of those children deemed to be making less than expected progress.

The graphs on the following pages show the end of key stage results for those children in receipt of the pupil premium grant. The results for this group of pupils has shown an upward trend at Canon Maggs since 2012 and the predicted results for 2015 are predicted to be at least in line with the 2014 results and in some cases they are predicted to be higher.


### A graph to show the % of level 4+ for disadvantaged pupils at the end of KS2 – the National figure versus the School results for 2014




## A graph to show the % of level 5+ for disadvantaged pupils at the end of KS2 – the National figure versus the School results for 2014




# A graph to show the % of disadvantaged pupils making 2 levels of progress at the end of KS2 - the National figure versus the School results for 2014




# A graph to show the % of disadvantaged pupils making 3 levels of progress at the end of KS2 - the National figure versus the School results for 2014
